Reflection for the 18th Sunday after Pentecost

Luke 7:11–16 – "Young man, I say to you, arise!"

The Compassion of Christ

In the Gospel today, we encounter Jesus entering the town of Nain just as a funeral procession is coming out. A widow is burying her only son. The Gospel says that Jesus "had compassion on her."

This word "compassion" in Greek, refers to a deep movement of the heart, a visceral reaction. Jesus is not distant or indifferent—He feels deeply the pain of this woman, who has lost her husband and now her only son. She is not just grieving; she is completely alone and vulnerable.

In this, we see the heart of Christ—a God who sees our tears and comes near to comfort us. He steps into the pain of our human condition and says: "Do not weep." Not as a command to ignore pain, but as a promise that He is about to do something that changes everything.

The Power of His Word

With one word, Jesus raises the dead: "Young man, I say to you, arise!" The dead man sits up and begins to speak. This is not magic. This is the divine authority of the Son of God, whose word brings life from death, hope from despair, joy from mourning.

This miracle points not only to Jesus' power over death, but also to the coming resurrection and the healing He offers in our own lives—even when situations seem "dead": broken relationships, crushed dreams, spiritual dryness. Jesus still says:

"Arise."

Let us hear this call anew—especially in our families, parishes, and communities where life may feel burdened or even lifeless. Christ's word can bring it back to life.

From Mourning to Mission

After the miracle, the people are filled with awe and glorify God. They say:

"God has visited His people." This is more than amazement—it is recognition. Jesus is the Messiah, the One who brings God's presence into human history.

The resurrection of the widow's son isn't just for her; it becomes a witness to the whole town. Our own experiences of healing, renewal, or answered prayers are not just personal—they are meant to become testimonies. Through us, God continues to "visit His people."

A Message for Today

We live in a world that often feels overwhelmed with grief—wars, broken homes, fear, and isolation. Like the widow, many feel alone. And yet, Jesus walks into those very moments, moved by love, ready to speak life.

May we, as Church, also be moved with compassion. Let us walk with the grieving, support the forgotten, raise the fallen, and comfort the lonely. Let us be the presence of Christ to those who mourn.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, You saw the pain of the widow and You acted with love and power. See our needs today. Speak life into what is broken. Raise what is fallen. And help us to be messengers of hope in a hurting world. Amen.
